I created a CSS rule you can apply to center lists. To properly center a list you have to put it in a division that gets centered but just doing that also centers the bulleted items which I really hate the look of.

So I added this to your page to center the red paragraph.

The Tree Handler link didn't work for two reasons.

First the URL was missing one level of the directory structure.

Secondly the anchor that it pointed to as incorrect. You had:

The correct syntax is:

```

Also I prefer to always use all lowercase in the URL, and that includes anchor tags. If you're telling someone the URL over the phone, it a lot easier to say, "In all lowercase, type..." then have to keep saying Uppercase, Lowercase for each letter. Unlike the domain name, the rest of the URL is case sensitive.

patchencalifornia.com/test and patchencalifornia.com/Test are two different pages.

I notice you constantly put a space before an exclamation mark. No need for that and it makes it harder to read.
